# WELCOME BACK TO SCHOOL

Welcome back to school and to our September newsletter. It is certainly good to be back; we are all looking forward to the next academic year. To ensure that information is shared in a timely fashion, the newsletter will be published once a month. ## ABSENCE

If your child is too ill to attend school, please ring and leave a message on the answerphone, preferably before 8.30 am.

If you have not contacted the school on the first day of absence by 9.15 am, then a member of the school staff will try to contact you. This is not a good use of resources but your child's well-being is of paramount importance. If school staff are not able to make contact, a home visit will be carried out as routine. Staff wish to ensure that your child is safe with you and has not been abducted or involved in an accident on the way to school.

If the school has to make contact on three occasions, rather than the person with parental responsibility informing the school of the reason for absence, then the Educational Welfare Officer (EWO) automatically visits the home to ascertain the reason for non-compliance with school policy.

If a child is absent for 5 days or more, then some form of medical evidence must be provided, e.g.: medicine prescribed by a medical practitioner.

When attendance falls below 90% the EWO is routinely involved with the situation. No further absence is authorised without some form of medical evidence.



## PERSISTENT ABSENTEEISM

Persistent absence is regarded as 90% or below. Consequently, if your child's attendance falls to 93% you will be requested to provide some form of medical evidence, for example, a prescription or prescribed medication, for the absence to be authorised by the school.

It should be the exception that attendance falls below 90% over a full year. 90% attendance means in effect that the child has missed, on average, half a day per week over the year! If 10% of absence is unauthorised, parents/carers may receive a penalty warning letter. If there is no improvement a penalty notice can be issued which is £60 per parent per child.

## REDUCING LATENESS

In the last academic year, there were 664 late marks in total. It is recognised that children are occasionally late due to traffic issues or simply a forgotten alarm call; however when children are late, it does impact on their learning and their well-being. It can be embarrassing walking into a room late especially if it is at a crucial time such as during registration and prayers. This academic year, in an attempt to reduce lateness, children who are late will participate in intervention sessions with Mrs. Harrington so we can ensure that they don't miss any learning time.

## AUTUMN TERM FUNDRAISING EVENTS

A 'Back to School' Disco will be held for Year 5 and 6 on Wednesday 12<sup>th</sup> September, 2023 and for Year 3 and 4 on Thursday 13<sup>th</sup> September, 2023. The discos begin straight after school so pupils can wear non-uniform **IF THEY ARE GOING TO THE DISCO**. Pupils without a ticket wear their uniform / PE Kit (on PE Days) as normal. Tickets cost £2.00 and are purchased in school. There is also a Tuck Shop available at each event. Please note that Wednesday's Disco (Y3&4) finishes at 4.30 pm.

## REQUESTS MADE TO PARENTS/CARERS

### WE NEED YOUR HELP!

1. Please ensure that your details are up-to-date with the school office: phone numbers, email addresses, emergency contacts and primary contact. The school office communicates with parents/carers via email and the School Spider App. We note that 326 parents/carers DO NOT use the app. We would love to use this as the main source of communication, but cannot do so due to under-use from parents. Each year, communication is flagged as an area to improve, but we need your help! ALL parents/carers should download the School Spider App. Then, we can use this as our main communication method.
2. OPAL Resources: Mrs. Lloyd-Green and Mr. Stalker ask again for any spare items which would be suitable for Outdoor Play and Learning. The children love dressing up, and this is the type of items which becomes consumable as it gets damaged more easily; small world items, such as animals, dinosaurs, action figures, cars. We need these as they tend to be lost / misplaced. If you are not sure if something is suitable for OPAL, simply ask Mrs. Lloyd-Green who will be happy to help.
3. Parent/Carer Book Club: the school staff are launching a book club which will be on a Tuesday evening from 5.30 pm once a fortnight, beginning on 19th September. Books and refreshments are provided. All are welcome. It is a good way to meet other parents/carers in an informal setting, to get 'back into reading' if this is something you don't seem to have the time for, or simply to have an hour to yourself chatting about the chosen books and life in general. Refreshments will be available so pick up a book and unwind... (school will be providing all books free of charge).
4. Lost Property: On behalf of all school staff, can we please ask you to name uniform and PE kit please; lunch boxes also benefit from being labelled. Please use labels or a Sharpie (biro fades and/or washes away). Any items left at the end of the last academic year, have now been washed and added to the pre-loved rail or disposed of.

## READING STRATEGY: 'READING REMARKABLY: TOGETHER!'

We are 'reading' high on the wave of well-deserved success for our Year 6 22/23 cohort in their Reading National Curriculum test results with 84.2% of pupils attaining the Expected Standard.

This success is, of course, also due to the unwavering efforts of our teachers and teaching assistants at every stage of our pupils' reading journeys and because of the support and commitment our parents/carers make to their children's reading progress and so it felt fitting to adopt a strategy of 'Reading Remarkably: Together!' as we work harder yet to foster an unquenchable thirst for reading in our children, alongside our inexhaustible efforts to develop confident and competent readers.

### How can our parents/carers support their child's reading progress?

Recent EEF research indicates that parents/carers have the power to support and improve their child's growth in reading by an additional 4 months per year and so, when we ask for your support it is so much more than the signing of a diary. Just by sitting with your child and listening to them read or reading aloud regularly to them, you have the power to make a positive impact on their reading capabilities: remarkable, right?

There are 10 ways that the government states that parents/carers can support reading at home:

1. Encourage your child to read;
2. Read aloud regularly;
3. Encourage reading choices;
4. Read together;
5. Create a comfortable reading environment;
6. Make use of your local library;
7. Talk about books;
8. Bring reading to life;
9. Make reading active;
10. Engage your child in reading in a way that suits them.



### What will the school be doing to support remarkable reading?

Teachers already deliver content from bespoke curriculum maps for reading that are progressive, engaging and exact to statutory requirements. Reading is aligned very closely to writing skills and a range of carefully selected texts serve as the focus of each unit, supplemented by thematic books as part of our Reading Spine. Feedback from our children shows us that they really enjoy the texts we choose for them in each year!

Our Teaching Assistants support the reading development of children identified as needing supplementary support. We have a number of specialist staff certified to deliver our SoundsWrite phonics programme too and training in this scheme continues. Teaching assistants also facilitate the changing of library books each week.




To support our parents and carers further we will be implementing the following for 2023/24:

Reading Remarkably: Together!' Drop In Sessions: every Monday from 3:00 to 3:30pm.

On these afternoons, Miss Massey will be available for support, should a parent or carer require such. If you find yourself in need and wish to discuss your child's reading choices or strategies to support at home, then email Miss. Further to this, we will be offering support via our social media with a monthly 'Reading Remarkably: Together! Round Up' for those parents/carers who are not able to access the Monday sessions, so keep an eye out for these.

For our parents/carers in Year 3, we will be offering a Phonics Workshop on our 'SoundsWrite' programme (date to be determined) as this differs to the Jolly Phonics programme utilised in St. Bede's Infant School. It is beneficial to understand how we use this supplementary scheme to ensure our children flourish in reading.



## **READING STRATEGY: 'READING REMARKABLY: TOGETHER!'**

### **How does completing a reading diary support my child in reading?**


Without doubt, reading is an essential skill for life but it is also an opportunity to really enjoy yourself too! Your continued effort is hugely imperative to the success and growth of your child's capabilities as we work together to ready our children for the rigours of everyday life. We therefore ask you to ensure that your child reads as often as possible across their busy weeks; it can be 10 minutes in the car or whilst they are waiting for their swimming lesson! They can read on the bus or whilst dinner is being prepared. The notion of a 'bedtime story' should continue as your child gets older and not be for younger children only.

By encouraging your child to write high quality comments about their reading in their diaries each day, it supports our teachers and Teaching Assistants with daily dialogues around remarkable reading and strengthens our efforts to 'Read Together'.

To encourage our readers further with this essential aspect of school routines, we will be rewarding our children for their routine record-keeping of 'Remarkable Reading' on a half-termly basis and so, children need to be in it to win it! Please ensure that children write their own high-quality comments - signatures in the boxes will not suffice!

### **When will children change their library books?**

As part of our promise to parents and children, we have also taken the time to review our library routines to ensure that routine time is assigned to books.



### **The schedule will be as follows:**

Monday - Year 3  
Tuesday - Year 4  
Wednesday - Year 5  
Thursday - Year 6

**There will be some flexibility afforded to pupils; however, they are encouraged to swap books on the designated day.**

If your child has been assigned a book band within our Collins scheme, we ask that you support us by ensuring their book selection remains within their assigned level.

### **Where can children read beyond the classroom?**

We already have a really comprehensive library in school and some quiet, cosy book-nooks where children can sit and enjoy a book. As part of our continued growth and in response to our children's requests, for 2023/24 reading at playtime and lunchtime we will be offering an outdoor book-nook so that, as part of our OPAL evolution, our children can enjoy a book amongst nature. Exciting times!

### **Can we still submit entries for the Summer Reading Initiative?**
