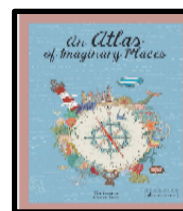
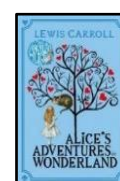
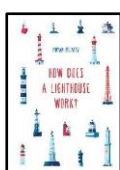


Year 3 Autumn Term: 'Learn to Read'

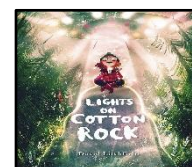
'Alice's Adventures in Wonderland' Fantasy-fiction

This text focuses on the science and history of lighthouses by Russian author and illustrator Roman Belyaev.

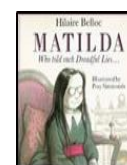
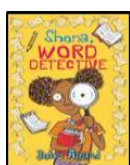
Children learn about volcanoes around the world and how they are created, from this engaging book by Geographics.
